From Pastor Mackay

This was a big week in my personal Bible reading plan. On Sunday, Sept 30, I read the final words of the Old Testament: the prophecy of Malachi. Then, bright and early on Monday morning, what lay before me was "In the beginning was the Word...," John's famous prologue. The Old has passed away, the New has come. Jesus is here!

We know well that Jesus is not welcomed with pomp and circumstance; such would belie his calling as a servant. Yet, he is welcomed with much singing. Mary sings (Luke 1). The angels sing (Luke 2). This shouldn't surprise us. When God works in a powerful way, his people sing (e.g., Exodus 15).

Singing expresses something deep. In their respective imaginary worlds, both C.S. Lewis and J.R.R. Tolkien use song as a picture of creation. In Narnia (Lewis), humans from our world hear the mighty Aslan sing, and by his words, a world and its inhabitants spring forth. Tolkien's work, *The Silmarillion*, sets forth the creation of Middle Earth in a similar way. The


great gods sing, and in their song life spring forth. The pleasant harmonies of this divine music bring forth good and beautiful things. When there is discord, darkness and evil emerge.

These two great thinkers only copy what God makes clear to us in his Word. Singing is a great gift of God that is to be deployed to the praise of God. Singing is God's command to his people (Psalm 33:2). It is to characterize the Christian's fellowship on earth (Eph. 5:19), and it will characterize the Christian's eternal fellowship in Heaven (Rev. 19). Even creation itself it exhorted to sing praises to God in respond to his mighty acts of redemption (Isa. 44:23).

In God's gift of the Psalms, we see that music is also means of expressing the complexities of life in this world. Songs enable us to voice our lament (e.g., Psalm 12) over sin and the confusion it can bring (e.g., Psalm 73).

Yet, above all else, music declares the glories of God. What a God to give us such a gift as this! Let us enjoy it as we worship together.

Discipleship

A GOD FOR ALL SEASONS

From Pastor Myers

I recently watched a marvelous film called A Man for All Seasons. I highly recommend it to you and your families as well. It is rated G.

Set during the tumultuous decades of the 16th century in Europe, the film follows Sir Thomas More as he interacts with and defies King Henry VIII's attempt to have his marriage to Catherine of Aragorn annulled and his relationship with the Roman Catholic church severed. Despite intense political pressure, More stood fast against Henry's whims and despotic tendencies, even to the point of being vanquished from his high office of Lord Chancellor and subsequently imprisoned. Refusing still to acknowledge Henry as head of the Church of England, More was stripped of everything, even his life, when he was executed as a traitor under false pretenses in 1535. His dying words echo throughout history to this very day, "I am the King's good servant, but God's first."

Now as an unabashed and proud protestant, I could not disagree more with More's staunch adherence to Roman Catholicism. The differences between Roman Catholicism and the Biblical Gospel are not smugable differences and must be reckoned with seriously, especially as we enter the month which celebrates the Reformation.

That being the case, however, I must give a tip of the hat to Sir Thomas More. I find his courage and steadfast conviction admirable and worthy of imitation by all Christians. Had almost anyone else been pressured to "just go along to get along" "just play the game", "sign the dotted line", such a person would likely have kept the fame and fancy estate and considered the violation of conscience to not be a big deal.

Thomas More, however, did consider the violation of conscience to be a big deal. Thomas More deeply believed in his heart of hearts that it is better to lose the world than to forfeit one's soul. Why? Because Thomas More truly believed that there is more to life than this world. He lived as though he actually believed in eternity. He lived as though he actually believed he lived before God

every second of every day. He lived as though he actually believed the faith he professed and that God would honor his faithfulness to Him no matter the earthly consequences. More believed that God was a God for all seasons.

It seems to me that today, large swaths of the American Church are in a crisis of courage. It seems as though there is much doctrinal and moral compromise, not just outside the church (which is to be expected) but, tragically, inside the church as well.

What is the explanation of this? There are surely many but one of the causes may well be an epidemic of spiritual myopia, a spiritual shortsightedness. Let's remind ourselves of the basics. Are we primarily setting our sights on eternity and the day in which we will meet Jesus face to face (1 Cor 13:12)? Do we live as though we actually believe we will be judged for even our idle words (Matt 12:36)? Or does the transcript of our lives reveal a tacit acceptance of John Lennon's theology, the theology which advocates that we live "only for today", that "there is no hell beneath us"? Do we live like More, willing to lose everything in the interest of truth, or do we live like Machiavelli, willing to triangulate anything in the interest of power?

Please let the seriousness of the Christian message and worldview grip you and take your soul captive even as it gripped a Roman Catholic like Thomas More. Jesus is good and will acknowledge us before the Father if we acknowledge Him before men (Matt 10:32-33). And God justifies those who believe in Christ (Rom 1:17). I am a protestant don't worry! But I pray that we would be a church of Calvinistic Thomas Mores. I pray that we would live in the constant trust that God is a God worth serving in all seasons.
